Carole James (c)

Finance spokesperson, B.C. NDP; MLA, Victoria-Beacon Hill

INFLUENCE: After leading the NDP in 2005 to its highest vote count since the mid-'80s (albeit in a losing effort), James was ousted as leader in 2010. Still, she remains arguably the most effective critic her party has, keeping the government in check as the NDP's finance critic.

FACTOID: James, who is part-Métis, is married to Al Gerow, elected chief of the Burns Lake First Nation.

Penny Ballem (d) City manager, City of Vancouver INFLUENCE: Dr. Ballem (she has an MD from UBC) has become the go-to administrator in B.C. for doling out tough medicine to public sector organizations, including B.C.'s ministry of health and, since 1998, B.C.'s largest municipal government.

THE PANEL SAYS: "She runs the city with an iron fist, and as B.C.'s deputy minister of health, she amalgamated all the health authorities from 40-something down to seven."

Elizabeth May (e)

Leader, Green Party of Canada; **MP**, Saanich-Gulf Islands

INFLUENCE: May made history by winning the Green Party of Canada's first elected seat in 2011; now, as one of Parliament's best performers, she's angling to win a few more seats for the Greens in the 2015 federal election.

FACTOID: May served as a policy advisor to former Mulroney environment minister Tom McMillan.

Jessica McDonald (f)

President and CEO, BC Hydro

INFLUENCE: McDonald—a former deputy minister and head of B.C.'s public service leads the province's biggest Crown corporation at a transformative time, with major capital improvements and the mega-billiondollar Site C project all about to take shape under her guidance.

FACTOID: Five of BC Hydro's eight-person executive team are now women.

Irene Lanzinger (g)

President, BC Federation of Labour **INFLUENCE:** Lanzinger, elected BC Fed president just last fall, is the first woman leader in the organization's history–and the first from the public sector side of the union movement. FACTOID: B.C.'s unionization rate was 31.5 per cent in 2013, from 42 per cent in '73.

Councillor and former chief, Musqueam First Nation **INFLUENCE**: A former threeterm chief of the Musqueam–and first woman elected regional chief to the
